ORCA: Open House and Open Doors

The Office on Returning Citizen Affairs has opened the new Reentry Resource Center. In fact, the door officially opened on July 8, 2013.

On August 6, 2013 Mayor, Gray, Deputy Mayor Paul Quander, CSOSA Director Nancy Ware, Gennine Hagar, Chief Probation Officer, and Professor Christi Cunningham of the Howard University School of Law were all on hand to lend their support to ORCA and pledge their continued collaborative efforts to reduce recidivism and increase the chances of successful reentry for Returning Citizens.

In his welcoming remarks Mayor Gray spoke extensively about the importance of Reentry support for the thousands of **District residents returning** annually. He reiterated the notion that Reentry is a national concern and emphasized the fact that the **District of Columbia is** leading the way with its innovative approach to reentry. For example the digital inclusion program **ORCA** offers serves as a model for the nation because for many men and women the changes in technology can pose as an insurmountable barrier. However, an opportunity to learn the necessary computer skills can give returning citizens a leg up in reintegration and obtaining and maintaining employment. ORCA has also launched the female

reentry initiative which includes The W.I.R.E. (Women Involved in Reentry Efforts). On August 14, 2013 members of the W.I.R.E., representatives of Department of Mental Health, Allen AME and D.C. Central Kitchen visited over 130 men and women at USP Hazelton who are scheduled to be released to the District within the next year. The men and women received information on vital resources offered in the community and words of encouragement, strength and hope.

ORCA is also leading the way in training practitioners and community organizations who are working with returning citizens. On August 15, 2013 The Office of Returning Citizen Affairs sponsored a Trauma Informed Care training with SAMHSA.

The training was designed specifically for those who are working in Criminal Justice and Reentry in an effort to reduce the likelihood of re-traumatization of returning citizens who are navigating the reentry process.

In October ORCA will be facilitating a panel discussion with W.I.R.E. members and community leaders who are involved and working with returning citizens to help enlighten them about the gender specific issues that female returning citizens face. As the District's Reentry Agency ORCA has taken the lead in helping returning citizens reintegrate by raising awareness, offering direct services and connecting returning citizens to vital resources.
